"Do You Have My Name"

One of the parables of Jesus was that of the Lost Sheep. "What man of you, having an hundred sheep, if he lose one of them, doth not leave the ninety and nine in the wilderness, and go after that which is lost, until he find it? And when he hath found it, he layeth it on his shoulders, rejoicing." Have we not had this experience in our family history research? Have we not felt an ancestor is asking us, "Do you have my name?" When that ancestor is found, do we not rejoice? "And when he cometh home, he calleth together his friends and neighbours, saying unto them, Rejoice with me; for I have found my sheep which was lost." When we have made that connection, do we not want to share it with others?

I have had an experience where I felt that a greatgrand aunt wanted me to find where she was buried. Even though I had most of her information, I felt strongly that I must go to that cemetery. Before the convenience of the internet, we would take family history trips that would include going to courthouses, historical societies, and cemeteries. I had called the city ahead of time to give me directions to the cemetery, and they told me that it was neglected and there were snake pits, and we needed to be careful. Again, I felt a strong desire to find her, and so we persisted. It was located in a nice neighborhood and was on about a half-acre. It was beautifully maintained, and at the back of the cemetery, there was her tombstone, and next to it was a daughter and grandson, which provided information I did not have. Now I have her name and those of her descendants as well. There is a joy for them and us as we continue to research our family regardless of the sacrifice. As we prepare to go to the temple, do we not feel some of our ancestors asking us, "Do you have my name?" All of them are waiting on us to bless them with eternal blessings.

Many times in the endowment, I have felt joy and peace and a special connection with an ancestor. When kneeling over the altar and sealing husband and wife and children together, I have felt surrounded by their love. Jesus wants us to find those lost sheep on the other side of the veil.

Elder J. Devn Cornish was sustained as a General Authority Seventy of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints on April 2, 2011. At the time of his call, Elder Cornish had been serving as a member of the Sixth Quorum of the Seventy in the



North America Southeast Area. He is currently serving in a number of committee assignments at Church headquarters.

He married Elaine Simmons in August 1973. They are the parents of six children.

He received a bachelor of arts in biology from Johns Hopkins University in 1975. In 1978 he received a doctor of medicine, also from Johns Hopkins University. He completed his pediatric residency at the Boston Children's Hospital at Harvard University in 1981.

He has served in numerous Church callings, including full-time missionary in the Guatemala–El Salvador Mission, bishop, stake president, president of the Dominican Republic Santiago Mission (2003–2006), and Area Seventy.

Elder David S. Kinard was named an Area Seventy and a member of the Tenth Quorum of the Seventy of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints at the April 2021 general conference. Elder Kinard received a bachelor of science degree in family science



and a master of science degree in organizational behavior, both from Brigham Young University. He has worked as vice president of human resources for Eli Lilly & Company and currently works as executive vice president of human resources for Elanco Animal Health. Elder Kinard has served in a number of Church callings, including full-time missionary in the Kentucky Louisville Mission, high councilor, ward Young Men president, counselor in a bishopric, bishop, counselor in a stake presidency, and stake president. Ask yourself, "When has Heavenly Father answered my prayers?"



The mission of OPEN M, a Christian ministry, is to provide pathways out of poverty by feeding the hungry, caring for the sick, and strengthening the community.

You can serve by doing the following;

Emergency Food Pantry: Package and distribute food bags; M-Th 9 am - 2 pm (pick one day); weekly commitment required.

Mountain of Food: Package and distribute 20,000lbs+ of food on the 3rd Friday of each month from 7:30 - 11:30 am.

Hot Lunch: Provide, cook and serve a hot lunch to 100 - 200 people. Hot Lunch is served during the last two weeks of each month from 10 am - 2 pm (choose one day a month).

Ideal for groups of 8 - 12 people.

Community Garden: Assist in the planning, planting, and maintenance of our "Lettuce Give Thanks Community Garden."

The Betty Beaver Conversion Story

When Betty Beaver was a child, she had a neighbor who taught Bible School on Tuesdays. Betty would sneak out of her parent's home to attend this little class and thought her mom and dad wouldn't miss her too much since she was the tenth of thirteen children. She learned a lot about Jesus and Heavenly Father, and as she grew up, she wanted to know more about God. She was part of another church and enjoyed attending with her aunt, who was there, but in 1988 she moved to Akron and didn't feel the same way about the churches in her new area. She felt a bit uncomfortable and not as much at home but continued attending since her children enjoyed going. She felt that something was better than nothing.

Betty was introduced to the Gospel of Jesus Christ when she was in the middle of raising her teenage daughter and enjoyed fellowshipping with the Elders as well as the Couple Missionaries who came into her home. She attended some but was unfamiliar with the 'language' which was spoken in church, like discussions on Brigham Young and such, and was somewhat confused. She stopped going but had good feelings about those who had introduced her to the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Even after her difficult divorce, Betty knew that God still had a plan for her, and she wanted to be worthy of the future she knew He would provide. She stayed true to herself and what she had learned growing up.

When her daughter grew up and married, she wanted to find her own church, eventually finding the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and invited Betty to come along with her to meetings and special events. Her daughter introduced her to sisters from the Relief Society who were so friendly and welcoming, even though they hadn't met her before. Betty felt loved and included like they had all known each other forever.

Her sweetheart Eddie came into her life after being a longtime friend, and Betty knew he was an answer to her prayers. She knew God had sent him to her. As she began attending church with her daughter, she felt God acknowledged things she experienced during the week as He worked through others. She found personal messages and answers in the testimonies each week. She found that things felt smoother and that there was less struggle than before she found the Gospel. She knew as she "opened her ears and shut her mouth and stopped denying wanting to be there," she would hear what she was feeling and recognize it more easily.

She chose to make it her mission to ensure missionaries were never forgotten again. All through this time, she loved their company, loved feeding them, and loved the spirit they brought into her home, but she kept saying, "I'm not gonna join your church."

Betty was baptized one week after she was married to Eddie and became a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latterday Saints in the autumn of 2019. She could tell the adversary tried her patience when she was choosing to be righteous and do what the Lord wanted. Others have told her they could see the light of Christ in her countenance, the "glow" of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and that makes the difference. The truth of the Gospel helps her rebuke the adversary and keep on the covenant path. She feels like everyone in her New Portage Ward is her family and loves them all so much. She strives to remain teachable and is happy to continue learning. She is excited to attend the temple as soon as she can to take out her endowments and has completed the Temple Preparation class with other friends in the ward.

If you missed it, try searching in your email with the following - "the greatest work on earth" (include the quotation marks).


