Stake Presidency Message

We experienced a summer full of activities that offered many of our youth opportunities to grow spiritually. For the Strength of Youth week-long programs, Young Men's and Young Women's camp, and a High Adventure for the older youth offered ample opportunities for youth and leaders to focus on spiritual truths. Spiritual truths exist that are absolute and applicable now and in the eternities. President Russell M. Nelson teaches this in his May 2022 talk titled "Choices for Eternity."

While helping to prepare a message for Young Men's camp, I was immediately captivated by this talk, and I suggest reviewing it as a refresher on eternal perspectives from our Prophet.

Here are some of the highlights of that talk that especially impressed me. First, please ponder this question, If Jesus Christ were to visit you, what do you think would be the first thing He would want you to know?

President Nelson says, "I believe that if the Lord were speaking to you directly tonight, the first thing He would make sure you understand is your true identity. My dear friends, you are literally spirit children of God.

You have sung this truth since you learned the words to 'I Am a Child of God.' But is that eternal truth imprinted upon your heart? Has this truth rescued you when confronted with temptation?"

President Nelson teaches that the identities we should prioritize are, first and foremost, that we are: 1)

a son or daughter of God, 2) a child of the covenant as members of His Church, and 3) a disciple of Jesus Christ. While discussing these identities, he shares this insightful teaching, "The way you think about who you really are affects almost every decision you will ever make."

I fully agree with that claim. In our own self-talk, we need to be gentle and kind. It would be a blessing to us individually if we make a concerted effort not to criticize ourselves. Especially don't make statements either to yourself or out loud stating "I am ... "and then adding a critical self-deprecating term.

President Nelson pleads with us to keep these identities in the forefront of our minds. He says, "I

plead with you not to replace these three paramount and unchanging identifiers with any others, because doing so could stymie your progress or pigeonhole you in a stereotype that could potentially thwart your eternal progression."

My hope is that we can all ingrain in our minds our individual identities as a son or daughter of God, as a child of the covenant, and a disciple of Christ. With these thoughts, we can be positively affected in "almost every decision (we) will ever make."



Stake High Adventure - Seek This Jesus

Our main hike and activity began on Friday morning as we embarked on a six-mile hike through the park.



The hike traversed the park and made several stops at scenic places along the way, including Old Man's Cave, Whispering Cave, Cedar Falls, and Ash Cave. These stops also included a spiritual message that focused on the theme. The youth learned about the importance of putting Christ first in their lives

and the power and strength that comes through our relationship with Him. They were also taught about the



doctrine of Christ and encouraged to read the Book of Mormon with a focus on identifying and marking their scriptures in a way to highlight the specific teachings of the



doctrine of Christ. Finally, the youth were taught about building and developing spiritual habits.



Following our long hot hike, we engaged in an epic water fight to cool off and prepare for a trip to Lake Logan, where

the youth had a chance to relax and swim. That night we gathered for a fireside devotional with messages

that again touched on Seeking our Savior, and we enjoyed s'mores by the fire before bed. Saturday, the youth participated in a rappelling activity near Conkles Hollow.



Each youth had a chance to rappel three different heights, the highest being 120 feet.

Young Men's Camp - Get Yoked

That same day we drove over to a large community pool in Uhrichsville. That night similar to last year, we had another thunderstorm, which never fails to make camp more interesting! On Friday, we went canoeing on the Tuscarawas River. The trip was 8 miles and took us about 2 hours. The rain from the prior evening made the trip much easier with the faster current! The rest of the day consisted of a few activities: Atlatl was led and taught by Brother Rodgers; he showed us how to throw arrows and had us aim at hay bales. Brother Oda taught a class on finance where he introduced us to investing and how if we are responsible with our money how it will benefit us in the future. We also learned about plumbing and had the opportunity to practice the skills we learned by building plumbing structures off of a diagram made by Brother Murawski.

That evening the priests split from the teachers and deacons for their own separate devotion. The priests and bishops hiked up Buzzard's Roost about a mile and a half, where we learned about the importance of the temple. We specifically learned more about the covenants we make during the endowment. Our leaders all shared a message with all of us and bore their own testimony about its importance and the power that can come through the endowment. Being able to hear that from our leaders was one of my favorite experiences from camp this year. Young Men's camp was a great spirit-nourishing experience this year, and I am already looking forward to next year.
